IT ALL STARTS WITH A VISIT!

In 2021, Texas visitors spent \$76.1 billion dollars, generating an economic impact of \$155.7 billion and supporting 1.1 million Texas jobs. (Source TravelTexas.com). That's the reason that in Texas, within Governor Abbott's Office, is the Office of Economic Development and Tourism. Tourism <u>is</u> Economic Development.

Tourism is a significant source of revenue for local business, job creation opportunities, and tax revenue for local taxing jurisdictions—off-setting taxes paid by local residents. "Direct travel spending in 2021 in Washington County was \$113.7M," said City of Brenham Tourism & Marketing Director Jennifer Eckermann, "and local tax revenue attributed to travel-related purchases reached \$10.1M, with 770 people employed in the local tourism industry that year." Eckermann added that local tourism

impacts for 2022, available later this year, are projected to show that even though visitation numbers declined, spend-

ing rose and the positive

effects of tourism on our community continue to grow.

The 3-year Visit Brenham/Washington County Tourism Strategic Plan—adopted in 2019—is a focus of action for Washington County communities. Read more here: https://docs.cityofbrenham.org/Departments/tourism-marketing/tourism-sap.pdf.

One recent example of tourism was Main Street's Annual Uptown Swirl on January 14th. Nearly 800 participants visited over 30 downtown merchants for wine tasting. Events like this

drive foot traffic to all businesses in the area. Terri Harris, owner of Mimi's Brenham, stated, "It was my highest sales day since last year's Swirl!" In addition, funds raised are used to provide grants to downtown businesses for façade improvement and signage, which helps maintain our most visited tourism asset in Washington County—our historic downtown.

The events and amenities that fill the pipeline for visitors: Downtown Brenham, Blue Bell Creameries Visitor Center, wineries and breweries, live music venues, sporting facilities, etc. also serve to improve the quality of life of local residents because the community is more attractive and lively, and that leads to a sense of pride among residents.

As an economic development organization in our area, we love people to visit our community, explore our area, spend their money here, and then stay a while. There's a lot to do and see in Washington County.





- WashCoTXJobs.com advertising video at the Westwood Theater to help local employers cast a wider net to recruit top-notch employees
- Hosted the Annual Red, White, & You Job Fair in November and a Job Fair targeting part-time employees in January
- Brenham Crossing announced the addition of James Avery, Great Clips, Ulta, and Burlington
- Brenham Market Square announced Chick Fil A, Wendy's, Academy, and a Wyndham hospitality project
- Project Stones Throw has 50+ acres under contract in Southwest Industrial Park

- Project Color Guard is negotiating an option for 10 acres in Southwest Industrial Park
- Brenham Community Development Corporation sold two tracts of property in Brenham Business Center for projects currently in development
- Project permitting remained strong through 2022 with 432 total permits. Inflation and interest rates are slowing the permit volume going into 1st quarter 2023.
- New Downtown businesses include: Wild Ones Baby Boutique and Glamfetti
- Downtown relocations and expansions include: Southern Fox, The Tilted Windmill, and Jet Set Chocolates

Focus: PACE Financing Opportunity

PACE—Property Assessed Clean Energy— is a financial tool that incentivizes Texas' property owners to upgrade facility infrastructure with little or no capital outlay. The program enables owners to lower their operating costs and use the savings to pay for eligible water conservation, energy efficiency, resiliency, and distributed generation projects. Eligible properties are Commercial Real Property, Industrial Real Property and Multi-Family Residential Real Property. More information is available here: TexasPaceAuthority.org.

HR ROUNDTABLE

The Human Resources (HR) Roundtable held its first meeting in January to discuss workforce challenges that employers are facing in Washington County. The group represented a wide range of employers from the private and public sector but they all shared similar stories related to hiring and retaining a solid workforce. Most private employers talked about their evolving talent requirements and the need for technical training. Some also shared the challenges of hiring reliable part-time workers.

One conclusion is that employers should work closely with local school districts, Blinn College and the A. W. Hodde, Jr. Technical Education Center to create career pathways so that the community of workers have clear employment goals.
