Advocacy for Economic Development in Austin



The 88th Texas Legislature is currently in session and advocacy for economic development policies is well underway. TEDC (Texas Economic Development Council) prepared legislative priorities which promote a positive business environment and pro-

economic development initiatives to enhance Texas' ability to compete for jobs and investment. See graphic below.

Washington County Day at the Capitol on

Monday, February 27th convened leaders from across Washington County, representing governing bodies, local businesses, and nonprofit organizations, to meet with legislators in Austin. Washington County leaders are working to make sure that local priorities are communicated to lawmakers. Along with the priorities listed below, we communicated other critical issues including:

<u>Water Resources and Availability</u>. It's imperative to maintain a balance between the demand for water from existing customers along with the developing potential water resources to meet the growth coming to our community.

Education. The Legislature must prioritize the needs of Texas students and educators to facilitate a safe and stimulating learning environment that leads to students graduating

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prepared with skills for a modern workforce. Additional funding for Career & Technical Education programs should be tied to the most highly in demand job skills by region.


<u>Broadband Access and Expansion</u>. All Texans need access to affordable and high quality internet broadband to maintain a competitive business advantage, to meet the needs of educating our workforce, and to facilitate access to healthcare in rural areas. The Federal definition of "high-speed" internet is woefully inadequate at 25 mbs down and 3 mbs up. Texas should lead the nation in access to true high-speed internet.

<u>Affordable Workforce Housing</u>. Although Texas real estate boomed over the last few years, workforce housing (for those at 80% Area Median Income) continues to be a challenge especially in rural communities where it is difficult to develop housing projects that cashflow with lower lease rates. Texas communities need effective tools that allow them to choose the projects that fit their community while not adversely impacting the local tax base.

Property Tax Reform. Property Tax Reform is a hot topic! As you can see from the nationwide analysis graphic below, Texas remains in the Top 10 for Lowest Total State-Local Tax Burden. That is great news! But Texas must implement an equitable, simplified school funding formula, and the Legislature needs to reevaluate their 2019 no new revenue cap of 3.5% imposed on local governing authorities (City, County, ISD). The 3.5% cap prevents these entities from even keeping up with inflation. Inflation impacts your local government just as it impacts your home or business! Loss of purchasing power due to inflation creates long-term issues with maintaining infrastructure, supporting well-qualified first responders, and other critical issues.



The Assumed Name Certificate (also called DBA—Doing Business As) is necessary in order to give notice to the public that an entity is conducting business under that name. In January, 27 businesses filed the certificate in Washington County. In February, 24 businesses filed. This is an indication of entrepreneurial activity in our community.

Housing Task Force Highlights

The City of Brenham Housing Task Force held it's last meeting on August 31st culminating in a report to City Council on Thursday, April 6th. The 24-member group agreed that the primary area of concern regarding housing in Brenham is for housing within the reach of our middle-income workforce.

Some of the findings they shared included changes to the code in the R-1 Residential Single-Family District and the R-2 Mixed Residential District. removal of the "homestead requirement" for Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU), opportunities for development on second and third-story residential units in Downtown Brenham, and the establishment of several subcommittees for further work.

The Task Force met six times since its establishment in July of 2022 and their report can be viewed online at CityofBrenham.org as part of the 4/6/23 Agenda Packet.
