## Non-Profits Provide Vital Purpose

he City of Brenham, through their Community Services Grant Funding Committee, recently awarded grants to Non-profits in Brenham. Washington County also has a mechanism to offer financial assistance to our local non-profits. I've been asked why the government awards grants when non-profits have other funding sources, so I thought a response was in order.



Non-profits have an important role in our community. They satisfy needs and provide a framework for the type of assistance that a government entity isn't necessarily equipped to handle.

Cities and Counties provide the services that a community must have like law enforcement, fire, parks and recreation services, emergency medical services, municipal courts and public works. These are the services that are closest to citizens' daily lives. No matter the size of local government, they use public funds to create policies in order to address public

needs with the highest quality services while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

Is it ever enough? Elected officials are often asked to do more to provide other vital services that a community needs, but it's just not practical. That's where non-profits come in.

A non-profit is uniquely designed to provide very specific (or hyper-focused) resources that help to maintain a community's viability.

Federal and state rules have been enacted to define a non-profit and provide guidelines for what they can and cannot do.



GBP is dedicated to driving economic growth and fostering investment in the Greater Brazos Region. The five counties involved are: Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Robertson and Washington.

The Greater Brazos Region is located at the heart of the Texas Triangle, one of the fastest-growing economic corridors. This central location provides direct access to a vast market, a robust supply chain, and a pro-business environment, driving cost efficiencies and operational excellence for businesses across various sectors.



The focus sectors for the region include: Aerospace and Defense, Energy, Life Sciences and Semiconductors. These are not traditional sector areas for Washington County so we are anxious to see how our involvement with GBP can help elevate our prospect options.

We have begun participating in committees to see how this new partnership can flourish in terms of new regional opportunities to use our collective competitive advantages.






